FRONT

It's really cold outside. You really need to put on a coat before you go out.

BACK

Está muito frio lá fora. Você realmente precisa vestir um casaco antes de sair.

put on = to dress oneself in something or place something on your body

Because of the cold it's very important to wear something warm before going out.

FRONT

I'm going to put on my best dress for church today.

BACK

Eu vou vestir meu melhor vestido para ir para a igreja hoje.

put on = to dress oneself in something or place something on your body

I want to wear something very nice today for the service.

FRONT

My three-year-old is still too little to put on his own clothes, so I have to dress him every day.

BACK

Meu filho de três anos ainda é pequeno demais para vestir suas roupas sozinho, então eu tenho que o vestir todos os dias.

put on = to dress oneself in something or place something on your body

My toddler is still too young to dress himself so I have to do it for him every day.

FRONT

I forgot to put my watch on my wrist this morning, so I have no idea what time it is.

BACK

Eu esqueci de colocar meu relógio no pulso esta manhã, então eu não faço ideia de que horas são.

put on = to dress oneself in something or place something on your body

This morning I did not place my watch on my wrist so I don't know what time it is.

FRONT

It's a good idea to put on a hat and some sunscreen before going outside on a hot sunny day.

BACK

É uma boa ideia colocar um chapéu e um pouco de protetor solar antes de ir para fora em um dia quente e ensolarado.

put on = to dress oneself in something or place something on your body

On a summer day it's very important to use a hat and some sunscreen.

FRONT

I saw my buddy from high school for the first time in 10 years, and he has really put on a lot of weight.

BACK

Eu vi meu amigo do ensino médio pela primeira vez em 10 anos e ele realmente ganhou muito peso.

put on = to add weight

My friend from high school has gained a lot of weight since I last saw him 10 years ago.

FRONT

I can't fit into my swim trunks from last summer because I've put on about 10 pounds.

BACK

Meu calção de banho do último verão não serve mais porque eu ganhei cerca de 10 libras.

put on = to add weight

I have gained 10 pounds since last summer so I am no longer able to fit into my swim trunks.

FRONT

When I came home from work my kids put on a little skit for me that they had practiced all afternoon.

BACK

Quando eu voltei do trabalho para casa, meus filhos apresentaram uma pequena paródia para mim que eles tinham praticado a tarde inteira.

put on = to perform or produce

After work my children performed a little play that they had prepared earlier in the day.

FRONT

Every year Central High School puts on a really amazing musical production.

BACK

put on = to perform or produce

Central High School performs a really great musical annually.

FRONT

Me: I had 10 girls give me their number and ask me out today!

My friend: I don't believe a word you say. You're putting me on!

BACK

Eu: 10 garotas me deram seus números e me chamaram para sair hoje!

Meu amigo: Eu não acredito em uma palavra que você diz. Você está me zoando!

put on = to intentionally mislead, usually as a joke

My friend does not believe that 10 girls hit on me today. He thinks I am just joking with him.

FRONT

My grandma used to get kicked out of a lot of baseball games because she would get really mouthy with the umpire.

BACK

Minha avó costumava ser expulsa de muitos jogos de baseball porque ela costumava falar demais para o juiz.

kick out = to forcibly eject someone from a place, usually because of bad behavior

my grandmother used to yell at the officials at baseball games and they would sometimes have to tell her to leave the game.

FRONT

James got kicked out of the military because he was frequently insubordinate.

BACK

James foi expulso das forças armadas porque ele frequentemente era insubordinado.

kick out = to forcibly eject someone from a place, usually because of bad behavior.

James was forced out of his military career because he often chose not to obey orders.

FRONT

Amanda got kicked out of her parents house when they discovered that she was abusing drugs.

BACK

Amanda foi expulsa da casa de seus pais quando eles descobriram que ela estava abusando das drogas.

kick out = to forcibly eject someone from a place, usually because of bad behavior

When Amanda's parents found out that she was abusing drugs they told her she could no longer live in their house.

FRONT

The protesters got kicked out of the rally after they got involved in a fistcuffs with some other participants

BACK

Os manifestantes foram expulsos da reunião depois que eles se envolveram em uma briga com outros participantes.

kick out = to forcibly eject someone from a place, usually because of bad behavior

After the protesters started punching and fighting with other people at the rally they were forced to leave the rally.

FRONT

We got kicked out of the restaurant because we couldn't stop laughing and causing commotion.

BACK

Nós fomos expulsos do restaurante porque não conseguíamos parar de rir e causar agitação.

kick out = to forcibly eject someone from a place, usually because of bad behavior

We laughed so much and made so much noise in the restaurant that we were asked to leave.

FRONT

I would never kick my teenager out of my home unless I felt physically threatened by him.

BACK

Eu nunca expulsaria meu adolescente de casa a não ser que eu me sentisse fisicamente ameaçado por ele.

kick out = to forcibly eject someone from a place, usually because of bad behavior

Unless I felt that I was in physical danger from my teenager, I would never forbid him to live in my home.

FRONT

Bobby and Cindy got kicked out of the theater because they refused to take out their crying baby.

BACK

Bobby e Cindy foram expulsos do teatro porque eles se recusaram a levar seu bebê que chorava para fora.

kick out = to forcibly eject someone from a place, usually because of bad behavior

Bobby and Cindy allow their child to cry in the theater and as a result were forced to leave the theater.

FRONT

Mrs. Jones will kick you out of her French class if you say bad words in French.

BACK

A Sra. Jones irá te expulsar da aula de francês dela se você falar palavrões em francês.

kick out = to forcibly eject someone from a place, usually because of bad behavior

Mrs. Jones will not tolerate foul language in her French class, and she will make you leave the class if you do.

FRONT

They will kick you out of this country very quickly if you commit a crime and they find out that you are undocumented.

BACK

Eles irão te expulsar do país deles bem rápido se você cometer um crime e eles descobrirem que você é ilegal.

kick out = to forcibly eject someone from a place, usually because of bad behavior

If you commit a crime in this country and they find out that you were here illegally they will deport you.

FRONT

I'm a very polite and considerate individual so I have never been kicked out of any event that I have been to.

BACK

Eu sou um indivíduo muito educado e atencioso então eu nunca fui expulso de nenhum evento que eu participei.

kick out = to forcibly eject someone from a place, usually because of bad behavior

Because I behave appropriately in almost every situation I have never been asked to leave or forced to leave any event.

FRONT

When my daughter Linnea was little she had a very sensitive stomach and threw up frequently.

BACK

Quando a minha filha Linnea era pequena, ela tinha um estômago muito sensível e vomitava com frequência.

throw up = to vomit

When Linnea was small she frequently vomited because her stomach was so sensitive.

FRONT

I drank some milk that wasn't too fresh and now I feel like I'm going to throw up.

BACK

Eu bebi algum leite que não estava bem fresco e agora eu sinto que eu vou vomitar.

throw up = to vomit

I'm feeling nauseous because I drink stale milk.

FRONT

My toddler threw up all over his bed and now I have to wash the sheets and clean the walls and the floor around his bed

BACK

Meu filho pequeno vomitou na cama inteira e agora eu tenho que lavar os lençóis e limpar as paredes e o chão em volta da cama dele.

throw up = to vomit

I have a big mess to clean up because my toddler vomited all over his bed.

FRONT

Whenever I feel like I have to throw up I take some Pepto-Bismol.

BACK

Sempre que eu sinto que eu tenho que vomitar, eu tomo um pouco de Pepto-Bismol.

throw up = to vomit

When I feel nauseous I ingest Pepto-Bismol

FRONT

If you feel like you have to throw up, please go to the bathroom immediately!

BACK

Se você sentir que tem que vomitar, por favor vá ao banheiro imediatamente!

throw up = to vomit

If you believe that you are on the verge of vomiting, please go right away to the bathroom.

FRONT

If you swallowed something potentially poisonous it's a good idea to try to throw up to eject the contents from your stomach.

BACK

Se você engoliu alguma coisa potencialmente venenosa, é uma boa ideia tentar vomitar para expelir o que tiver no seu estômago.

throw up = to vomit

Induce vomiting if you believe you may have ingested something poisonous

FRONT

I rarely get sick. I can't even remember the last time I threw up.

BACK

Eu raramente fico doente. Eu não consigo nem me lembrar a última vez que eu vomitei.

throw up = to vomit

I have been healthy for so long that I can't remember the last time I vomited.

FRONT

They threw that skyscraper up very quickly. It was completed in just six months!

BACK

Eles levantaram aquele arranha-céu muito rápido. Ele foi terminado em apenas seis meses.

throw up = to build or erect hurriedly

That skyscraper was erected in only six months!

FRONT

Many houses are thrown up so quickly these days that the quality of the workmanship is very shoddy.

BACK

Muitas casas são levantadas tão rápido hoje em dia que a qualidade da mão-de-obra é muito precária.

throw up = to build or erect hurriedly

much of the craftsmanship in modern homes is of inferior quality because the houses are constructed so quickly.

FRONT

When the townsfolk found out that the president's motorcade would drive through their neighborhood they quickly threw up a big welcome sign for him.

BACK

Quando os moradores da cidade descobriram que a comitiva do presidente passaria pelo bairro deles, eles rapidamente levantaram uma grande placa de boas-vindas para ele.

throw up = to build or erect hurriedly

When the people of the neighborhood discovered that the president would be passing through their neighborhood they quickly erected a sign of welcome for him to see.
