Sentences for Anki | Lesson 15

FRONT

As I walked past the fence, a huge St. Bernard started running at me and barking, so I had to get away quick.

BACK

Assim que eu passei pela cerca, um São Bernardo enorme começou a corer em minha direção e a latir, então eu tive que <u>escapar/dar o fora</u> rápido.

get away = to break free or escape

A St. Bernard is a very large dog, and can seem scary. You can imagine that this person could have been frightened by the dog and want to get away, or escape from where it was. He probably ran, or walked quickly, in order to get away fast.

FRONT

My dad has been really stressed at work recently, so our family decided to get away and go on a vacation to the Bahamas.

BACK

Meu pai tem estado realmente estressado no trabalho recentemente, então nossa família decidiu viajar e sair de férias para as Bahamas.

get away = to leave or go somewhere to be safe or in a better place

When work is stressful, sometimes you daydream about being somewhere better, somewhere relaxing. In this case, the family decided to get away, or go to somewhere better and relaxing so that their dad could get away from the stress of his work for a little while.

FRONT

Helen called a babysitter to watch the twins so her and her husband Dave could get away for the night and go to a quiet dinner together.

BACK

Helen chamou uma babá para cuidar dos gêmeos para que ela e seu marido Dave pudessem <u>sair</u> à noite e ir para um jantar calmo juntos.

get away = to leave or go somewhere to be safe or in a better place

Helen and Dave are probably young parents who have been busy taking care of their twins. Maybe they haven't been out just the two of them in a number of months. Helen got a babysitter so that her and Dave could take a break from caring for the twins and go to dinner just the two of them.

FRONT

When the guards accidentally left the keys by the gate, the prisoners were able to get away

without even being noticed.

BACK

Quando os guardas deixaram as chaves por acidente do lado do portão, os prisioneiros conseguiram <u>escapar</u> sem nem mesmo serem notados.

get away = to break free or escape

The prisoners were locked up in jail, probably locked behind a gate. But because the guards were absent-minded, or lazy, they left the keys in an easy spot. The prisoners were able to escape, or get away, very easily.

FRONT

When my grandmother left open the door to the front porch, my dog got away before I could catch her.

BACK

Quando a minha avó deixou a porta da varanda da frente aberta, minha cachorra <u>escapou</u> antes que eu pudesse pegá-la.

get away = to break free or escape

Sometimes dogs have a desire to break free, or escape from their homes or their fences if they have an opportunity. In this case, the grandmother left the door open and the dog got away quickly before the owner could catch him.

FRONT

Because the meeting about finances ran late, I wasn't able to get away from the office until after 8pm.

BACK

Porque a reunião sobre finanças aconteceu tarde, eu não consegui <u>sair/deixar</u> o escritório até depois das 8 da noite.

get away = to leave or go somewhere to be safe or in a better place

Most people like to leave their work around 5 or 6pm. This person had a meeting that went way too long, and caused him to stay at work until 8pm. He wasn't to able to leave, or to get away from work until after 8pm.

FRONT

The old car had smoke coming from the engine, so Jake told the little boys to get away from the garage as fast as they could.

BACK

O carro velho tinha fumaça saindo do motor, então Jake disse aos garotinhos para <u>saírem</u> da garagem o mais rápido que pudessem.

get away = to leave or go somewhere to be safe or in a better place

This situation could have been dangerous. The engine of the car was smoking, and Jake likely thought that it might cause a fire, or even blow up. He told the little boys to get away, or run away, from the car as quickly as they could.

FRONT

When the two students started to argue loudly, I decided to get away before things turned physical.

BACK

Quando os dois alunos começaram a discutir em voz alta, eu decidi <u>sair/escapar</u> antes que as coisas ficassem "físicas".

get away = to break free or escape

In this case, the boys were arguing loudly and may have started to physically fight one another. This person did not want to be involved in that, so they decided to get away, or leave and go somewhere else.

FRONT

Sara bought 10 raffle tickets to see if she could win the getaway to Mexico.

BACK

Sara comprou 10 rifas para ver se ela conseguia ganha a viagem de férias para o México.

get away = to leave or go somewhere to be safe or in a better place

A "getaway" is a trip or vacation. In this case, Sara wanted to win a free getaway to Mexico by buying raffle tickets. She wanted to win the getaway to go on vacation and be in a relaxing place.

FRONT

Katie and Sam used to live in the big city, but they wanted to get away from all the traffic and noise.

BACK

Katie e Sam constumavam morar na cidade grande, mas eles queriam <u>fugir</u> de todo o tráfego e barulho.

get away = to leave or go somewhere to be safe or in a better place

Big cities can be difficult to live in sometimes because there are so many people. This creates a lot of traffic, noise, and other annoying things. Katie and Sam wanted to go to a place that was better for them. They wanted to get away from the city, leave the city, and go somewhere else.

FRONT

Harry was trying to come out with a plan to get out of jail, even though the protection was very high.

BACK

Harry estava tentando arranjar um plano para <u>escapar</u> da prisão, embora a segurança fosse muito alta.

get out = to break free or escape

Harry is in jail and wants to escape, or break out. He is trying to come up with a plan to get out of jail.

FRONT

The chess club wanted to <u>get out</u> the news about their championship victory, so they ran an ad in the school newspaper.

BACK

O clube de xadrez queria <u>espalhar</u> as notícias sobre sua vitória no campeonato, então eles colocaram um anúncio no jornal da escola.

get out = to become known, especially information

In this case, the chess club won a championship tournament. They wanted more people to know about their victory. They decided to put an ad in the school newspaper so that the information would become known to others - the information would get out.

FRONT

Jamal's mom yelled at him to get out from underneath the car because it was dangerous.

BACK

A mãe de Jamal gritou para ele <u>sair</u> debaixo do carro porque era perigoso.

get out = to break free or escape

Being underneath a car is not the safest place to be. Jamal had crawled under the car, and he mother was concerned. She yelled at him to get out from underneath the car.

FRONT

Hallie wanted to get the word out about her party, so she texted all her friends and asked them to let everyone know.

BACK

Hallie queria <u>espalhar a notícia</u> sobre sua festa, então ela enviou mensagens para todos os seus amigos e pediu a eles para avisar todo mundo.

get out = to become known, especially information

Hallie wanted a lot of people to know about her party. In this case, to get the "word" out means to get out information, or to let people know. She texted her friends and asked them to text everyone else, so that everyone would know.

FRONT

By the time they had cleaned up the car accident, the news had already gotten out that it was Kaleb's fault.

BACK

Quando eles terminaram de limpar "a bagunça" do acidente de carro, as notícias já tinham se espalhado que era culpa de Kaleb.

get out = to become known, especially information

In a car accident, you always try to figure out whose fault it was to determine whose insurance will help pay for the damages. In this case, they finished cleaning up the accident, and had already figured out that it was Kaleb's fault. The news had gotten out, or become known, that it was Kaleb's fault.

FRONT

We need to get out of here before the lightening comes!

BACK

Nós precisamos sair daqui antes que o relâmpago venha!

get out = to break free or escape

Most likely, these people are outside, either in a park or otherwise. They can tell that a storm is coming and do not want to be caught outside when it is lightening. They decide they need to escape, or get out before the storm comes.

FRONT

I've been doing work in the house all day and feel like I need to get out and get some fresh air.

BACK

Eu tenho trabalhado na casa o dia todo e eu sinto que preciso <u>sair</u> e pegar um pouco de ar fresco.

get out = to break free or escape

If you stay inside all day, you will likely feel trapped or a bit claustrophobic. This person wants to get out, or go out of the house because they feel they have been trapped inside doing work all day. To get out and get some fresh air means to be outside and have a change of scenery.

FRONT

The word got out that the President of the university was not actually qualified for his job.

BACK

A notícia <u>se espalhou</u> que o presidente da universidade não estava na verdade qualificado para o seu trabalho.

get out = to become known, especially information

The President of the university is supposed to have certain experience that allows him to be qualified to do his job. In this case, someone found out that the President was not qualified, and the word got out. The information about the President became known to everyone and he will likely be asked to resign.

FRONT

When I came into the kitchen, I heard my mom hitting the broom on the floor and yelling "Get out!" as a mouse was running across the floor.

BACK

Quando eu entrei na cozinha, eu ouvi minha mãe batendo a vassoura no chão e gritando "Sai daqui!" enquanto um rato estava correndo pelo piso.

get out = to break free or escape

The mom is trying to get the mouse out of her house. The mouse likely came in in search of food or scraps and does not belong there. The mom is yelling "Get out" to the mouse to scare it into leaving.

FRONT

After we did our research, we wanted to get our findings out to the public, so we published in a national journal.

BACK

Depois de fazermos nossa pesquisa, nós quisemos <u>anunciar nossas descobertas</u> ao público, então publicamos um periódico nacional.

get out = to become known, especially information

When doing research, scientists or researchers want others to know about their discoveries. In this case, they wanted to get the information out to the public, so they published their discoveries in a national journal. They got out the information.

FRONT

When the storm came, we knew the lights would go out.

BACK

Quando a tempestade veio, nós sabíamos que a energia acabaria.

go out = to become extinguished, or to turn off

Sometimes when there is a storm, the electricity will temporarily turn off, or go off. These people knew that the lights would go out when the storm came.

FRONT

After working on my paper for 8 hours straight, Tom decided it was time to go out with his friends.

BACK

Depois de trabalhar na minha redação por 8 horas a fio, Tom decidiu que era hora de <u>sair</u> com seus amigos.

go out = to leave your house, to be social

Tom has been working hard on paper, and he has been working all day - 8 hours straight! He maybe decided it was time to take a break and have some fun. He wanted to go out, or

leave the house, and be social with his friends.

FRONT

My heart goes out to the victims of the earthquake because I know they have suffered and lost a lot of their belongings.

BACK

Meu coração <u>doi/se entristece</u> pelas vítimas do terremoto porque eu sei que eles sofreram e perderam muitos dos seus pertences.

go out = to be empathetic, or sympathetic towards a situation

In this case, to say that your "heart goes out" means that you feel empathy, or sadness for someone else's situation. Because the victims of the earthquake were in a terrible situation, this person was feeling sad for them. Their heart goes out for the victims.

FRONT

Because I didn't bring my charger to work, I knew the power on my laptop would go out soon.

BACK

go out = to become extinguished, or to turn off

In order to keep a laptop charged and powered up, you have to have a battery. If the battery is left at home, you may only have a little bit of time before the power runs out. This laptop's power will go out, or turn off, very soon.

FRONT

It was Friday night and the girls were getting ready to <u>go out</u> with the new boys that they met at school that week.

BACK

Era sexta-feira à noite e as garotas estavam se arrumando para <u>sair</u> com os novos garotos que elas conheceram na escola naquela semana.

go out = to leave your house, to be social

To go out means to be social. A lot of times to "go out" means to go to a movie, to go to dinner, or to go hang out somewhere that will be good for talking and having a good time. These girls are going to go out with the boys they met at school.

FRONT

The campers spent a few hours trying to build a fire, but when the rain came, they watched it go out in a matter of minutes.

BACK

Os campistas passaram algumas horas tentando fazer fogo, mas quando a chuva veio, eles assistiram ele <u>se apagar</u> em uma questão de minutos

go out = to become extinguished, or to turn off

The campers took a long time to build their fire. You can imagine it was hard work. When the rain came, their fire quickly was extinguished, or went out. They were likely disappointed when they watched the fire go out.

FRONT

Billy asked Marion to go out on a date, so they met at the restaurant at 7:30pm.

BACK

Billy chamou Marion para <u>sair</u> para um encontro, então eles se encontraram no restaurante às 7:30.

go out = to leave your house, to be social

Often times, to "go out" refers to going out on a date. They are not just being social, but they are going out romantically. In this case, Billy and Marion will go out on a date at 7:30pm.

FRONT

Even though she spent a lot of money on them, Jane knew these boots would <u>go out</u> of style in a few years.

BACK

Embora tivesse gastado muito dinheiro nelas, Jane sabia que aquelas botas <u>sairiam</u> de moda em alguns anos.

go out = to be unfashionable

In this case, "go out" means to stop being fashionable, or to "go out" of fashion. Jane bought some expensive boots that she liked, but she knew in a few years they would not be fashionable any more. They would go out of fashion.

FRONT

When Samuel came home from college over Christmas, he wanted to go out with his old high school buddies just like they used to.

BACK

Quando Samuel voltou para casa vindo da faculdade para o natal, ele queria <u>sair</u> com seus colegas do ensino médio exatamente como costumavam fazer.

go out = to leave your house, to be social

When friends want to get together, they will "go out". In this case, you can imagine that Samuel hasn't seen his friends in quite some time and wants to have a small reunion. They will go out in order to talk and catch up.

FRONT

After staying home with her new baby for 2 months, Kelly was ready to go out on a date with her husband Kyle.

BACK

Depois de ficar em casa com seu novo bebê por 2 meses, Kelly estava pronta para <u>sair</u> para um encontro com seu marido Kyle.

go out = to leave your house, to be social

Kelly has just had a new baby, and has been staying home with the baby for 2 months. You can imagine that she has maybe been lonely at home and wants to have some fun. She wants to go out and be social with her husband.
