FRONT

The existence of Islam dates back to the seventh century and the life of Mohammed.

BACK

Islam has been around since the time of the prophet Mohammed.

FRONT

American hegemony over the Great Plains dates back to the 19th century.

BACK

date back = to have existed for or since a particular point in time

The United States has been the dominant force on the North American prairie since the 1800s.

FRONT

My friendship with my best buddy dates back to our high school years.

BACK

date back = to have existed for or since a particular point in time

My best friend has been in my life since we met in high school.

FRONT

Many baseball traditions, such as the seventh-inning stretch, date back to the Taft administration.

BACK

date back = to have existed for or since a particular point in time

Many rituals that have to do with baseball have been in existence since the time that Howard Taft was president of the United States.

FRONT

The influence of the French language on the development of the English language dates back to the Norman invasion of 1066.

BACK

After William of Normandy conquered the British Isles in 1066 we see a dramatic increase in the amount of Latin-based vocabulary entering the English language via Norman French.

FRONT

Native American use of the horse dates back to the time of the Spanish conquistadors.

BACK

The indigenous peoples of north America began to use the horse after the Spanish conquistadors brought the horse to the North American continent in the 16th century.

FRONT

I show up to work every day whether I feel like going or not.

BACK

show up = to arrive, to be present

Regardless of how I may be feeling, I arrive every day at my job.

FRONT

I get so nervous performing in front of other people that I'm not sure whether or not I'm going to show up for my piano recital this weekend.

BACK

show up = to arrive, to be present

Being the focus of attention in front of a group of people brings me anxiety so I'm not sure I will be present for my piano recital.

FRONT

If we don't show up on time for our flight, the airline is not going to wait around for us!

BACK

show up = to arrive, to be present

If we are not present when the time comes for the flight to leave, the airplane will not wait for us.

FRONT

We didn't adopt our dog Fido from the pound, he just showed up a few years ago on our doorstep and has been with us ever since

BACK

show up = to arrive, to be present

"The pound" is a term often used for a place where stray animals are confined. We did not adopt our dog from such a place, he simply appeared on our property and we decided to

keep him.

FRONT

When I was in school my parents did their best to show up for every sporting event that I participated in.

BACK

show up = to arrive, to be present

When I played school sports my parents made every effort to be physically present to watch me play.

FRONT

If you use red ink when writing on red paper, you're writing will not show up very well.

BACK

show up = appear , be visible

It will be very difficult to clearly see the writing if you use red ink on red paper.

FRONT

A couple of strange spots started showing up on my television screen so I had to take my TV into the repair shop.

BACK

show up = appear , be visible

I had to have my television fixed when I started to notice the spots on the screen as I was watching television.

FRONT

FRONT

BACK

miss out = to fail to participate in or enjoy an event or opportunity

When my parents sent me to bed early when I was younger it upset me because I thought

they were probably doing lots of cool things without me.

FRONT

My friends tell me that if I don't come to Rio in February I will miss out on all the excitement of Carnival, but to be honest, I prefer to go to Rio in January to avoid all of those crowds.

BACK

FRONT
