FRONT

The Christians called on God to take away their troubles.

BACK

call on = to ask for help

In this situation, the Christians asked God to help them.

FRONT

The President <u>called on</u> China for financial aid after the floods destroyed much of the country's agriculture.

BACK

call on = to ask for help

The President is asking China to help them rebuild their country after a terrible flood.

FRONT

I called on my parents to lend me money to go on a date.

BACK

call on = to ask for help

Here, I am asking my parents to help me pay for my date.

FRONT

We <u>called on</u> my brother when we were on vacation in Florida.

BACK

call on = to visit

While in Florida, I am going to visit my brother who lives there.

FRONT

The doctor <u>called on</u> his patient who was sick in the hospital.

BACK

call on = to visit

In this case, the doctor is going to visit and check the condition of his patient.

FRONT

We could <u>call on</u> our grandmother if we have time tomorrow.

BACK

call on = to visit

Here, I am suggesting that we could visit our grandparents.

FRONT

The debater <u>called his opponent on</u> several misstated facts.

BACK

call on = to challenge

In this example, the debater reveals that his opponent has given false information.

FRONT

I <u>called my sister on</u> those out-of-fashion boots she was wearing.

BACK

call on = to challenge

My sister wore boots that I believe are not very fashionable. So, I suggested to her that maybe she should rethink her decision to wear them.

FRONT

My math teacher <u>called on</u> me today, and I got the answer wrong.

BACK

call on = = to ask someone to do something, especially to speak in public. (formal)

My math teacher asked me to answer a math question in class. I verbalized my answer to the classroom, and my answer was incorrect.

FRONT

The soccer coach <u>called on</u> Tim to show his teammates how to perform a soccer drill.

BACK

call on = to ask someone to do something, especially to speak in public. (formal) The soccer coach asked Tim to demonstrate how to do a soccer drill in front of his teammates.

FRONT

The football team evened up the score during the second quarter of the game.

BACK

even up = to make something fairer or more equal

In this example, a football team that was losing a game was able to tie the score in the second quarter.

FRONT

The kids' allowances were <u>evened up</u> a little when Sarah was given the same spending money as Tammy.

BACK

even up = to make something fairer or more equal

In this case, Sarah did not get as much money to spend from her parents as her sister Tammy at first. After some time, Sarah's parents decide to make her and her sister's allowances even.

FRONT

I need to even up the legs of the table before I assemble it.

RACK

even up = to make something fairer or more equal

In this scenario, I am building a table and need to make sure the legs of the table are even

lengths.

FRONT

The principal evened up the number of students in each classroom.

BACK

even up = to make something fairer or more equal

Let's say there are thirty students in a school. The principal divides the students up into three classes of ten.

FRONT

Sandy evened up the placemats before the guests arrived.

BACK

even up = to make something fairer or more equal

Perhaps one of the placemats was crooked, and Sandy straightened it to make them appear even .

FRONT

Last week's test evened up Tom's and Jerry's class averages.

BACK

even up = to make something fairer or more equal

Before last week, Tom had a class average of 97, and Jerry had an average of 98. Now, they both have a 98.

FRONT

The last game evened up my chess record against June.

BACK

even up = to make something fairer or more equal

I had beaten June three times in chess while she had beaten me four. Now, we have beaten each other the same amount of times.

FRONT

The chef added more rice to my plate in order to even things up.

BACK

even up = to make something fairer or more equal

In this case, the chef is putting rice on to several plates. At the end, he sees that my plate has less than everyone else, and he adds more.

FRONT

My boss evened up our salaries this year.

BACK

even up = to make something fairer or more equal

In this situation, my boss paid his employees different amounts last year. Now, he is paying us all the same amounts.

FRONT

The two women <u>evened up</u> their height for the photograph by having one wear high heels and the other flat shoes.

BACK

even up = to make something fairer or more equal

In this example, two women are different heights, but by wearing different shoes, they make themselves the same height.

FRONT

The bodybuilder juiced up before the muscle competition.

RACK

juice up = to make something more exciting or perform better

The bodybuilder exercised and took sports performance medicines to help him win a competition.

FRONT

I juiced up my car with a brand new engine.

BACK

juice up = to make something more exciting or perform better

I made my car faster by putting a new engine inside it.

FRONT

Larry is buying more memory to juice up his computer.

BACK

juice up = to make something more exciting or perform better

Larry is going to upgrade his computer with more memory in order to make it perform better.

FRONT

They tried to juice up the party with loud music.

BACK

juice up = to make something more exciting or perform better

In this case, the people play loud music to try and make the party more exciting.

FRONT

On our train ride, the conductor really juiced up the engine and took us on a fast ride.

BACK

juice up = to turn on the electricity to something

The conductor used the engine's full power and made the train go extra fast.

FRONT

The janitor <u>juiced up</u> the building with electricity.

BACK

juice up = to turn on the electricity to something

In this case, the janitor turned on the electricity.

FRONT

I had to juice up my cell phone before I could make any calls.

BACK

juice up = to turn on the electricity to something

My cell phone is off, and I have to turn it on in order to use it.

FRONT

The college students were juiced up at the local bar last Saturday night.

BACK

juice up = to drink one or more alcoholic drinks

The college students were heavily intoxicated.

FRONT

Tammy was really juiced up at the party.

BACK

juice up = to drink one or more alcoholic drinks

Tammy was highly intoxicated.

FRONT

Hey Carl, let's go get juiced up tonight?

BACK

juice up = to drink one or more alcoholic drinks

In this example, I am asking Carl to go out and drink alcohol with me.
